


MELODY TAYLOR HONORED WITH CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

Jan. 8th, our Educational Chairpersons Taiche Griffin, ARNP and Katina Wilson, ARNP were the health facilitators at Love Christian Fellowship Church in Orlando where the topics were breast and cervical cancer, diabetes, and hypertension. The information was well received.

On Jan. 17th, we served as the healthcare vendor at the City of Clermont's Waterfront Park Dr ML King Day event. Members Ruby Alvarez, Alversia Williams, Latanya Lewis, Kathy Hunter, Sherikey Mobley, Misha Carson, and Melody Taylor made this another successful event with Oncology education on breast and prostate cancers, heart disease, hypertension, and diabetes. Literature on burn safety and falls prevention was distributed as falls is the number one risk factor for injury in the home.

Our 1st Membership Meeting for 2022 was well attended on Jan. 22nd. We welcomed 4 new members who joined the national and local BNRO chapter. In the words of Dr ML King, Jr., "Everybody can be great...because anybody can serve," and serving our communities is what we do with willing hearts.
